the cohort group to receive all the doses of COVID 19 vaccine.

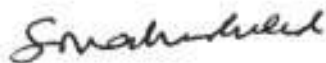

MPVHA AT A GLANCE

Madhya Pradesh Voluntary Health Association (MPVHA) is one of the largest health & developmental network of NGOs in the state. It came in existence in 1973, to meet the health needs of the people and to enhance their role in health promotion and development. MPVHA strives to fulfil its vision of "Holistic Health and Health a Reality for All" by ensuring active participation and involvement of people of the state.

In its 50 year - long journey, it took up several challenges to strengthen the voluntary health movement and to promote community health in the state. From health to community health, community health to women's health, women's health to women's rights, whatever terms used from time to time, the focus always remained over women, adolescents and children, with special emphasis on weaker, marginalized & vulnerable section of the society.

MPVHA efforts are widespread and at deeper levels, known to be moderately modernized and technologically advanced and always meant to purify the vibration of all those, who believe in community health promotion. One can experience greater opportunities, higher quality, relationships, greater experience and insight, enhancing creativity, intuition and extra sensorial perceptions. The direct benefit however, is that of enhancement in capacity, skill and in creation of a people oriented health and development movement.

LEGAL STATUS AND FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT :

MPVHA is registered as a secular, non-political and non-profit making organization, under Society's Registration Act XXI of 1860. The organization has also been registered under Section 12-A and 80-G of Income Tax Act, EPF, TDS and Foreign Contribution Regulation Act (FCRA). It is also registered under "NITI Aayog" Darpan Portal of Government of India.

PRESENCE IN THE STATE :

It has its presence in almost all districts of MP, either through its large network of member voluntary organizations (includes community & rural development organizations, women organizations, hospitals, dispensaries & health centers) or through various projects in different geographical areas of Madhya Pradesh.

INFRASTRUCTURE :

The main office of MPVHA is located at Indore and the Project Offices are setup in project areas as and when required. Offices are well equipped with basic amenities, required to run it in a professional manner.

MANAGEMENT :

The organization is governed by a 9 member team, elected by the General House, known as the Governing Board of the Association. The Governing Board is assisted by two committees i.e. Program Advisory and a Finance Committee. The Governing Board of MPVHA meets from time to time, to review, suggest new changes, steer the activities and to take policy decisions, in order to achieve the desired goal of the Association. The Executive Director of MPVHA is the **Chief Executive**, responsible for execution of all the affairs and activities, including day-to-day administration. He is also an Ex-officio member of the Governing Board and one of the signatories for bank operations.



MPVHA TEAM :

MPVHA's team includes a wide range of professionals, such as Medical Professionals, Social Workers, Trainers, Finance & Accounts persons and Administrative staff. The organization has multicultural setting, in which staff members belonging to varied fields and expertise, are rendering their services (full as well as part time). The organization has a well-defined HR and finance policy. The staffs working in MPVHA has a long experience varying from 2 to 30 years, in health and other development sectors.

AREAS OF EXPERTISE :

1. **Training and Capacity Building:** It is one of the core areas of the organization. MPVHA is involved in building capacity of top, middle & front line functionaries of voluntary & Govt. organizations on health, development and enforcement of Laws.
2. **Liaison & Networking:** Conscious efforts are being made towards strengthening its network by involving likeminded groups, health & non health organizations, individuals & other important national and international agencies for health & development.
3. **Facilitation and Campaign on important issues:** It has been an integral approach in its five decades of health promotion, for making people more observant and conscious towards their health needs and rights.
4. **Community Mobilization:** This is a continuous process in which MPVHA is involved through member organizations and its innovative projects.
5. **Information Dissemination:** Large number of need based publications like newsletters, booklets, training manuals, posters, stickers, audio-visuals have been produced, which has been acknowledged & used by both Govt. & civil societies. Latest technologies have also been integrated for Information & Dissemination.
6. Implementation of innovative health & developmental projects in urban & rural pockets of the state.
7. **Research & Studies:** Many studies are also conducted simultaneously.
8. **Part Services:** This has also been included to abridge the gap between service seekers and providers and cater the needs of poorly served areas.

Chapter 1

Eye Care

India has a significant burden of eye problems, with an estimated 5 million people suffering from blindness and another 45 million suffering from various forms of vision impairment. Cataracts are the leading cause of blindness in India, accounting for over 60% of all cases. Other major causes of blindness include refractive errors, glaucoma, corneal blindness, childhood blindness and age related muscular degeneration. Approximately 80% of blindness and low vision in India is avoidable, meaning it can be prevented or treated with the right interventions.

Gender disparities and poorer access to services in the urban slums and rural areas are still a challenge in India including Indore M.P. The other reason is that India has witnessed a demographic transformation over the past 50 years with life expectancy increasing to 68.8 years with improved survival rates, witnessing into the increase in population aged > 60 years. This has a significant impact on current and future eye care challenges, as more than 80% of blindness and visual impairment is age-related.

Looking into the seriousness of the problem MPVHA with the support of Sightsavers and Fullerton India is catering the needs of urban poor and extending support to the Department of Health and local Administration in eye care programme in Indore for last many years.

1. Amrita Drishti Urban Eye Health Program (UEH)

Under this project, "Nayan Mitra" mobile vision centre reaches the urban slums and provides its services to the people, who are marginalized/ under-served/ un-reached. The "Nayan Mitra" mobile vision van reached to the urban slums of Indore city and provided services like: vision screening, identification of refractive errors, cataract, referrals, counselling and near vision spectacles distribution to the beneficiaries. Project also does liaison and networking with corporate, industries, community based organizations, old age homes, local leaders etc. to reach every section of the society. Community awareness, distribution of IEC materials, inter personal communication, liaison with authorities, especially Health & Administration and outreach activities are the major components of the project.

Qualitative output :

- Mobile van reached to the most vulnerable, marginalized and poor section of the urban slums and rural pockets of Indore.
- Reached to doorstep and provided opportunity to women for eye test, unable to reach eye centre.
- Referred cataract cases for free operation through government and private infrastructure, thereby project is supporting blindness program in the district and state.
- Near vision spectacles made available to the beneficiaries on the spot.

2. National Truckers Programme for Eye Health "RAAHI" Drishti Kendra

In India 65% goods are transported through roads by 90 lakh truck drivers and transporters. To keep the roads safe, it is necessary that the vision of truck drivers and cleaners should remain healthy in terms of visibility. The trucker's fleet that follows a more difficult lifestyle pattern, pertaining to their task of operating across long distances (at night), without taking sufficient rest, calls for urgent eye health interventions.

The major challenges observed that the truck drivers do not take care of their eye health, neither go for glasses against their refractive errors, as this requires sufficient time and quality services readily available nearby them. MPVHA is doing this project with the support of Sightsavers and Cholamandalam. The current phase is designed to reach out to the maximum number of individuals according to their feasibility. For this, centre based as well as an outreach camp based approach were adopted to deliver the services.

Activities organized

1: Services of the RAAHI Vision Centre

RAAHI Vision centre is situated at Transport Nagar, Indore, where trucks and other heavy vehicles stop over for a short period. The following services are provided by "RAAHI" centre to truckers.

Chapter 2 Capacity Building

Capacity building is a process of empowering individuals, organizations and communities through providing knowledge, skills to improve their decision making abilities and achieve their goals. Capacity building can include training, mentoring, coaching, technical assistance, networking and resource mobilization etc. Capacity building can occur at various levels, from the individual to the network and can cover a wide range of areas and subjects such as education, health, agriculture, governance and environmental sustainability etc. MPVHA from its inception is involved in capacity building of field level workers, middle managers and top authorities of civil society and government both.

1 : Modular Training of ASHA (Accredited Social Health Activist)

One of the key components of National Health Mission (NHM) is to provide every village with a trained female health activist which is popularly known as ASHA (Accredited Social Health Activist). Reason, the National Health Mission (NHM) envisages achievement of universal access to equitable, affordable and quality health care services that are accountable and responsive to people's needs. Therefore ASHAs have been engaged under the mission for establishing a link between the community and the health system. ASHA is the first port of call for any health related demands of deprived sections of the population, especially women and children, who find it difficult to access health services in rural areas. ASHA program has been successful in bringing people back to Public Health System and has increased the utilization of outpatient services, diagnostic facilities, institutional deliveries and inpatient care.

Capacity building of ASHA is being viewed as a continuous process. ASHA have to undergo series of training episodes to acquire necessary knowledge, skills and confidence for performing her spelled out roles. Like the previous years, this year too M.P. Voluntary Health Association was given the responsibility by NHM (Department of Health and Family Welfare) Govt. of MP through its District Health Society, Khargone for conducting ASHA training.

Chapter 3

Gender and Declining Child Sex Ratio

PCPNDT stands for the Pre-Conception and Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques Act, which was enacted in India in 1994 to combat the pervasive practice of sex-selective abortions due to a preference for male children. The law prohibits sex selection, pre-natal diagnosis, and sex determination of the fetus and regulates the use of technologies, such as ultrasound and amniocentesis, that can be misused for purposes of sex selection. The law provides for the establishment of regulating authorities in each state and the central government to ensure compliance and enforcement of the act. Violation of the act can result in fines and imprisonment. The law has been amended from time to time to strengthen its provisions and improve enforcement. Despite these efforts, sex-selective abortions continue to occur in India, posing a significant challenge to the effective implementation of the PCPNDT act.

Preference for the male child, has been one of the most evident manifestations of gender discrimination in our society. With the advancement in medical science and technology, sex selection has moved from female infanticide to sex selective abortions or female foeticide. Despite gains in education, longevity and income for some groups of women, large sections of Indian Society still consider daughters as a liability and are apparently stopping down to any level in order to avert their birth.

Sincere efforts made by MPVHA in collaboration with State and District Administration, Department of Health (PC PNDT Cell). From time to time MPVHA efforts have been recognized by State and District Appropriate Authorities and media which is one of the motivating factors, that forced the team to continue with the efforts without funding.

Activities organized

1 Gender and Pre-Conception & Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques : MPVHA in collaboration with District Administration and Department of Health & Family Welfare, GoMP initiated and continued its efforts to address the issue in a systematic manner. Orientations, meetings, distribution of IEC material, strengthening of PC & PNDT advisory committee, training of monitoring team, monitoring of USG Centres and collective liaison with the appropriate authority, were the main components.

2 Efforts made in Indore District : MPVHA as an active member of PC & PNDT Advisory Committee has played a vital role in extending the hands of the District Collector-cum-Appropriate Authority in terms of building the capacity of law enforcers, mobilizing the community and strengthening the monitoring system. Executive Director as member of Monitoring team contributed in terms of monitoring of large number of USG centres on a regular basis.

3 Support as a Resource Organization to the State and other districts : MPVHA as a resource organization extended support in terms of IEC material and Resource Persons as and when required by the State Authority, District Collectors and Regional Joint Directors (Health).

4 Appraisal of new centers: After the the COVID pandemic the PCPNDT Cell flooded with a large number of applications for providing registration for opening new USG, MRI and CT Scan in the city. As a member of monitoring team MPVHA extended rigorous support to the District Administration and Health department in terms of doing appraisal of new applicants.

Chapter 4 Vaccination

Vaccination refers to the process of administering a vaccine to create immunity to a particular disease. Vaccines work by stimulating the immune system to produce antibodies against a particular pathogen. When exposed to the actual pathogen, the immune system can recognize and respond to it more effectively, reducing or preventing illness. Vaccination has been a crucial tool in preventing and eradicating infectious diseases, leading to significant improvements in public health and overall quality of life. However, vaccine hesitancy and refusal remain a global challenge, leading to outbreaks of preventable diseases and hindering efforts to control pandemics such as COVID-19. The focus of MPVHA always remained on preventive and promotive aspect of health, therefore immunization program was always in priority in the agenda of organization.

Immunization programs have been in place for many decades, and have helped significantly reduce the rates of morbidity and mortality from vaccine-preventable diseases worldwide. Routine immunization is a public health strategy aimed at protecting individuals and communities from vaccine-preventable diseases. It involves the administration of vaccines to people of all ages, particularly children, to provide immunity against specific infectious diseases, such as measles, mumps, rubella, polio, hepatitis B, and others. The World Health Organization (WHO) recommends a basic schedule of immunization, usually starting at birth, with additional doses given at certain intervals.

1 : Routine Immunization

MPVHA and its members operating in different parts of the state always extend the hands of government, especially Department of Health in maximum coverage of immunization program. Our focus always remained to reach the un reached.

2 : Demand Generation through Engagement of Community Based Institutions for Routine Immunization, COVID-19 Vaccination and Key Convergent Behaviors in 7 Tribal Districts of Madhya Pradesh.

During the COVID 19 Vaccination, access to routine immunization became a big challenge in the state due to various factors, including various resource constraints, diverted health priority, vaccine hesitancy and approval of new cohort groups. It was also observed that people have become reluctant and COVID Appropriate Behaviour (CAB) also gone down. The above project supported by UNICEF played significant role in strengthening the routine immunization along with completion of all COVID Vaccination doses (booster). The strategy adopted by MPVHA and UNICEF involving multiple NGOs working in particular districts proved boon for the qualitative and quantitative achievements. MPVHA being a lead agency involved 7 NGO partners and 140 CBOs in 7 tribal districts Alirajpur, Jhabua, Dhar, Ratlam, Betul, Chhindwara and Mandla.

Strategies were to empower the NGO Partners and CBOs on social mobilization and community engagement to promote routine immunization, COVID-19 vaccination and COVID appropriate behaviour (CAB) including awareness generation in the community. The focus was more on left out and drop outs (LODOR) to have complete doses and wider coverage.

The integrated communication with planned approach and technical support of UNICEF made the task easy to all the NGOs to reach the targeted population. The biggest achievement was immunization of 2253 LODOR Children.

3: Momentum Routine Immunization Transformation & Equity (MRITE)

The COVID-19 vaccination campaign in India had faced significant challenges in reaching marginalized and vulnerable population. The country's vaccination drive began in January 2021, with priority given to healthcare and frontline workers, followed by those over 60 years of age and those between 45 and 59 years with co-morbidities. However, the vaccination drive had been criticized for not adequately addressing the needs of marginalized and vulnerable populations, including those living in poverty, marginalized ethnic groups and the rural population. Many marginalized and vulnerable populations lack access to vaccination sites due to poor transportation and infrastructure. There had also been issues of vaccine hesitancy, particularly among marginalized communities due to fake news and misinformation campaigns.

Momentum Routine Immunization Transformation & Equity (MRITE) project supported by John Snow India Pvt Ltd. and USAID, focused on ensuring COVID-19 vaccination coverage among marginalized and vulnerable populations in 10 districts of Madhya Pradesh. These districts were Alirajpur, Barwani, Dhar, Bhind, Chhatarpur, Khargone, Jhabua, Shajapur, Shivpuri, and Neemuch. The project aimed to achieve 100% vaccination of all left out eligible beneficiaries residing in identified underprivileged areas within these districts through demand generation and support for service delivery mechanism. The focus was to reach out to the elderly, physically disabled, migrant communities, visually impaired etc.



Activities Organized :

1 Collaboration and Coordination : Coordination with district and block health officials, NGOs, faith-based organizations (FBO), local influencers, self-help groups (SHGs), NRLM groups, "Saathiya Brigade" of the RKSK, religious leaders and institutions. Establishing partnerships and engaging these stakeholders supported to ensure a comprehensive and unified approach for community mobilization.

2 Awareness Activities and Community Engagement : Awareness activities at marketplaces, flagging off chariots by the authorities played a vital role in effectively disseminating information and creating a sense of urgency regarding COVID vaccination.

3 Orientation of Frontline Workers and Panchayat Representatives: Orientation of frontline workers, healthcare personnel, panchayat representatives and civil societies done. These sessions helped to disseminate correct information about vaccination and encourage community members to avail vaccination services.

4 Partnership: Partnerships with Government, Corporate, Industries, Railway, Judiciary Services, Jail authorities helped in reaching to various targets. These collaborations also facilitated resource-sharing, logistical support and enhanced access to target population.

5 Leveraging National and Religious Festivals: National events like Independence Day (15th August), Republic Day (26th January) and religious festivals were also availed for community engagement and mass awareness.

6 Service Delivery Support: To ensure smooth and efficient delivery of vaccination services, MPVHA provided support to the existing service delivery mechanisms in the target districts. This included training and facilitating the logistics required for vaccine distribution.

7 Monitoring and Evaluation: Close monitoring done under the M-RITE project to assess progress, identify areas for improvement, vaccination coverage rates, analysis of data, demand generation etc. to gauge the project's impact.

Chapter 5 Nutrition & Fortification

The World Health Organization (WHO) and other international agencies have recommended the widespread use of fortified foods, including salt and rice, as a means of addressing nutritional deficiencies. The fortification of salt and rice is a process in which essential nutrients are added to these common food items to increase their nutritional value. Two of the most common fortified nutrients are iodine and iron, which are added to salt and vitamin B12, folic acid and iron to rice, respectively.

1 : Double Fortified Salt and Fortified Rice Program in Madhya Pradesh

The Iron deficiency is most common nutritional disorder in India affecting particularly to the vulnerable population. The recent results of the NFHS – 5 also indicates that the Anaemia is a severe public health problem in India. As more than 50% pregnant women are affected with anaemia and contributing to the maternal mortality rate and low weight birth. The total population of Madhya Pradesh is 8.33 Crore spread across 52 districts which consist of 313 blocks, as per the projected population in 2020. The prevalence of anaemia is particularly high among women of reproductive age (15 to 49 years) i.e. 54.7% and 72.7 % in children as per the National Family Health Survey-5 (2019-21).

To address the severe issue of anaemia among the population, especially in women of Madhya Pradesh, the Government of Madhya Pradesh has taken several initiatives including large scale food fortification programs. The Government of Madhya Pradesh (GoMP) introduced Double Fortified Salt (DFS) in 89 tribal blocks of 20 tribal districts at INR 1 per kg through the Public Distribution System.

MPVHA is extending field level technical and facilitation support for rolling out the Double Fortified Salt Program with the support and guidance of Nutrition International across the state in 180 blocks spread across 37 districts and Fortified Rice Program in across the 52 districts through PDS and all 52 districts for Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), Mid-day Meal (MDM), Tribal Welfare Department (TWD), District Hospitals (DH) and Nutrition Rehabilitation Centres. Fortified Rice is being in supply through the PDS to the NFSA beneficiaries and SSNPs in all the 8 aspirational districts of Madhya Pradesh i.e., Barwani, Chhatarpur, Damoh, Guna, Khandwa, Singrauli, Rajgarh and Vidisha. Extending support to the government in the execution of all the feasible activities to strengthen the program by engaging the key stakeholders in a strategic partnership to establish the processes, integrate the monitoring and reporting mechanism, improve supply chain management, capacity building and behaviour Change communications.

Overall objectives is to support the Government of Madhya Pradesh in increasing the coverage and improving the quality of food fortification programs.

Activities organized

Throughout the period, team has used a multi-pronged approach to ensure uninterrupted supply of fortified staples through social safety net schemes (PDS, ICDS, DH & NRCs), capacity building of



beneficiaries of the program, especially to the adolescent girls, pregnant women, and lactating mothers. All the core domains of the program were monitored by the team randomly i.e., Warehouses, Fair Price Shops, Households, Anganwadi Centers, District Hospitals, Nutrition Rehabilitation Centers and Millers.

Chapter 6 Tobacco Control

Tobacco consumption is a significant public health problem in India, with an estimated 267 million tobacco users in the country. According to the Global Adult Tobacco Survey (GATS), over 28% of the Indian population uses tobacco, including smoking and smokeless forms such as gutka, pan masala, and khaini. Tobacco kills up to half of its users. Every year tobacco kills more than 12 to 13 lakhs people in India. According to the most recent GYTS (Global Youth Tobacco Survey) Report 2019 conducted by GoI among the children aged between 13-15 years states that 3.9% of students (4.4% boys and 3.5% girls) in MP currently use tobacco products. This is alarming that a large percentage of young children are using tobacco at an early age. They get attracted toward the surrogate advertisements and glamourisation of newer tobacco products like e-cigarette. There is an urgent call to save our children from the tobacco epidemic.

Govt. of India has made The Cigarette and other Tobacco Products (Prohibition of Advertisement and Regulation of Trade and Commerce, Production, Supply and Distribution) Act" (COTPA), 2003. The government has also increased taxes on tobacco products to make them less affordable and to discourage consumption. However, despite the measures taken, tobacco use remains high in India. The availability and accessibility of cheap, unregulated, and illicit tobacco products continue to be a significant challenge for tobacco control in the country.

In recent years, the Indian government has taken further steps to strengthen tobacco control measures, including the cessation centers and the ban on electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS) such as e-cigarettes. Overall, tobacco control remains a critical public health issue in India which needs continued efforts to address the challenges and reduce tobacco consumption in the country.

The National Tobacco Control Programme (NTCP) supports advancing the provision laid down in India's tobacco control act (COTPA, 2003) through the state tobacco control cell (STCC) and District Tobacco Control Cells (DTCCs). The NTCP mandates for full implementation of all provisions of COTPA. The progress of tobacco control efforts are visible in the state since they began in 2008. GATS-2 shows that in Madhya Pradesh a decline of 5.3 percent points has taken place - from 39.5% (in 2008-9) to 34.2% (2016-17) in overall tobacco consumption. GATS-2 results also show that 34 percent adults use tobacco, 10.2 percent adult smoke and 28.1 percent adults use smokeless tobacco.

1: Strengthen and Sustain Tobacco Control through capacity building, effective legislation, M&E and stopping TI Interference in Madhya Pradesh, India.

MPVHA has made rigorous efforts for tobacco prevention and control in the state in collaboration with Department of Health, State Tobacco Control Cell, Administration, Police and other various departments. It has implemented the project "Strengthen and Sustain Tobacco Control through capacity building, effective legislation, M&E and stopping TI Interference in Madhya Pradesh, India" with the support of International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease (The Union-Bloomberg). This year the focus was more on 7 districts of Rewa and Shahdol Divisions i.e. Rewa, Satna, Singrauli, Sidhi, Shahdol, Umaria and Anuppur districts. However, the previous efforts in other divisions/districts were sustained with the help of the District Tobacco Control Cell.



Activities organized

1. **Assessment:** The mapping and Baseline surveys of all seven districts of Rewa and Shahdol division.
2. **District level workshops:** Sensitization workshops organized under the chairmanship of District Collectors in Rewa, Sidhi and Umaria districts and a total of 230 officials from various departments were oriented on harms of tobacco use and various sections of COTPA 2003 Act.
3. **Capacity Building:**
 - Training for District Nodal Officers and Enforcement Squad organized by the State Tobacco Control Cell (STCC) in collaboration with MPVHA inviting enforcers from all 52 districts. Block level officials training organized and about **206** officials in Sidhi district, **195** officials in Satna district, **222** officials in Rewa district, **150** officials in Shahdol district and **96** officials in the Umaria district attended the program.
 - Training of 96 Panchayat secretaries in Rithi and Badwara and other blocks. 5 Sensitization workshops at Block level, 154 officials were sensitized. Orientation of Bidi rollers in Jabalpur district, 47 Bidi Rollers oriented. Orientation of Municipal Officials-25 officials were oriented. ToT in Police department in Dindori district. 30 Officials were trained.
4. **Educational Material:** Many new educational materials produced, revised and reprinted to strengthen the program at all levels. These are as follows:
 - Reference cum advocacy kit for policymakers.
 - Guidelines for making Tobacco Free Educational Institution (ToFEI).
 - Training of Trainers and Enforcers Manual.
 - Handouts for mass awareness on ill effects of tobacco use.
5. **Enforcement:**

The training of enforcement squad and DNOs resulted into the enforcement of different sections of COTPA-2003. The fines collected against violation deposited and reported properly from district to state.

The STCC has provided funds for printing of Challan receipts and enforcement squad activities to all the districts.
6. **News Coverage:** There were wide coverage of news in print, electronic and other social media platforms including the government public relations website.
7. **Vendor Licensing:** For the vendor licensing the state has issued the order to the district level authorities and corporations but implementation is a major challenge.
8. **Ban on Hookah Bars:** MPVHA made a sincere effort to push the complete ban on Hookah Bars in the state in collaboration with various departments and administration.
9. **Article 5.3 of FCTC:** A series of orders from state, division and district level authorities have been issued on Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC)-Article 5.3 and to support the implementation of different sections of Indian Tobacco Control Act-COTPA.

10. **World No Tobacco Day:** Observed on 31st May 2022. Various awareness activities organized in 27 districts involving administration, various departments and civil societies. Campaign material like Fact sheets on the theme 'Tobacco-Threat to our Environment, T Shirts, Flex Banners etc were used to reach around 38 million people.
11. **State-level Consultation on WNTD:** Organized involving media, cancer specialist, civil society, doctors, and other stakeholders for sensitization of senior officials and policymakers.
12. **Orders and Directives:** Series of Orders and directives issued/procured at division and district level in Shahdol & Reva division.

2: Scaling up Tobacco Control in India: Comparing Smartphone to in-person training for implementing an evidence based intervention to reduce tobacco use among school teachers

MPVHA is extending support for the research project titled "**Tobacco free Teachers- Tobacco free Society.**" The study which is being conducted by the Healis Sekhsaria Institute of Public Health, Mumbai with the support of Harvard T.H Chan School of Public Health, Boston, Dana Farber Cancer Institute, for motivating the people for tobacco cessation. They identified the teachers as a most powerful motivating agents for this program.

The formative research/Phase-I for the project started in 1st October 2021-30th September 2022. In the formative phase the aim was to identify the pilot and intervention districts for the study to be implemented. The formative phase for extended till March 31st 2023 in first amendment of MOU and till 30th September 2023 in latest MOU amendment. The following activities were carried out during the formative/pilot phase of the study.

The study is still going on and will continue for another two to three years. All the above first year activities were conducted well in time.

3: Observation of World No Tobacco Day 2022-Sensitization and Mobilization of Urban and Rural Population in 25 districts of Madhya Pradesh.

Every year World No Tobacco Day is observed on 31st May. In the year 2022 the theme was **“Tobacco: Threat to our environment”**. The campaign was aimed to raise awareness among the public on the environmental impact of tobacco – from cultivation, production, distribution and waste to give tobacco users one extra reason to quit. The campaign aimed to expose tobacco industry's effort to “green wash” its reputation and products by marketing themselves as environment friendly. A series of events organized with active involvement of administration, civil societies, various departments, media and other important stakeholders throughout the state with the support of World Health Organization.

The following activities were carried out to observe WNTD 2022 by MPVHA

- 1 Development of Fact Sheet and messages for sensitization and awareness.**
- 2 Awareness Chariot** (Mobile van with display and IEC material) flagged off by state, district, block level officials and public representatives in 27 districts of Madhya Pradesh which covered almost 50 percent of the districts of the state. This flagged off decorated van apart from city reached to 3 to 4 blocks to cover rural population too. The total population covered was around 20 million. In this process MPVHA has used its large network of member voluntary organizations to ensure all the events to be done in a systematic manner in their

respective districts and blocks. A total of 32 NGO partners in 27 districts actively participated in the events.

- 3 **Consultation with stakeholders on WNTD theme in Smart City Indore:** MPVHA in collaboration with State Press Club organized a consultation with the help of experts at Indore. The purpose was to sensitize the smart city to convert themselves as healthy cities and compliant to Indian Tobacco Control Act (COTPA-2003). Lots of new initiative in terms of environment, air pollution and disposal of garbage is taking place in smart cities, through this consultation officials, workers and support agencies were sensitized.
- 4 **Campaign and Advocacy** Material in the form of T-Shirts, Handouts, Newsletter were developed on the theme of WNTD and were distributed to support the campaign. The T-Shirts distributed among NGO partners in various districts of Madhya Pradesh along with government departments and other stakeholders. The T-Shirts used during rallies, signature campaign and other events in various districts

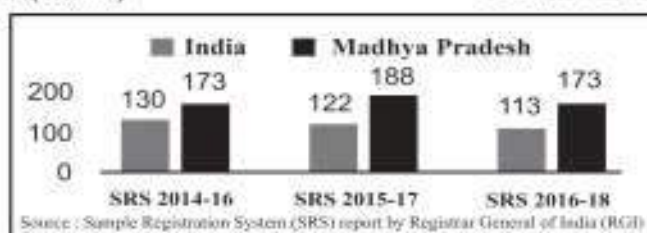

Important Points to Remember

Corporate Social Responsibility :

Every company which needs to comply with the CSR provisions have to spend 2% of the average net profits made during the preceding 3 years as per the CSR policy. The computation of net profit for CSR is as per Section 198 of the Companies Act, 2013.

FCRA Return :

The amended Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act, 2010 mandates that every person/NGO/ Association (hereinafter referred to as an "entity") that have been granted FCRA certificate of registration or prior permission u/s 12 of the Act shall open an "FCRA Account" at specified branch of State Bank of India in New Delhi. The Central Government vide notification dated 07.10.2020 has notified New Delhi Main Branch (henceforth NDMB) of SBI, 11, Sansad Marg, New Delhi-110001 as specified branch.

The return is to be submitted for each financial year (1st April to 31st March) within 9 months of the end of the year, i.e. by 31st December of each year. The filing of a '0' refund, even though no international donation is received / used throughout the year, is compulsory.

FCRA Amendment :

Part of the foreign contributions that can be used for administrative costs is now reduced to 20% . Any administrative cost exceeding 20% will need prior approval from the Central Government (Section 4, Pg 2, FCRAAmendment 2020).

As per the amendment of Section-7 of FCRA FC registered organization would not be entitled to transfer or sub-grant any of the FC funds to any organization whether registered or un-register under FCRA.

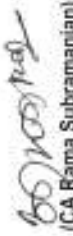

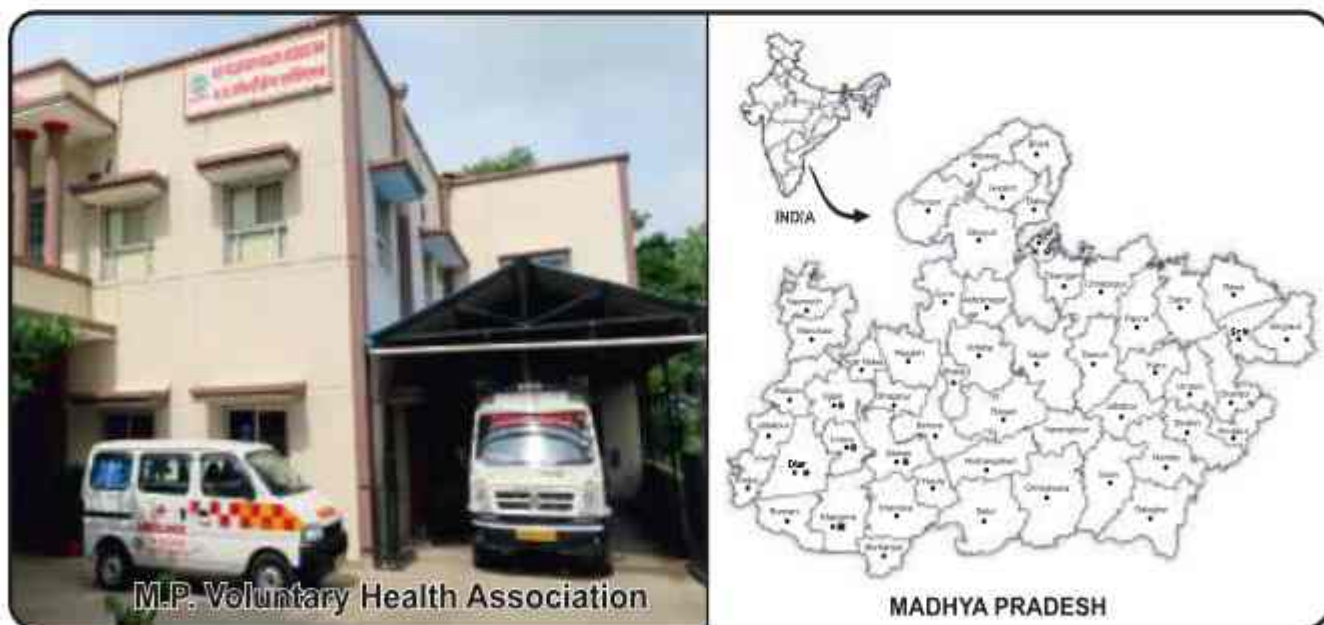

MPVHA efforts are widespread and at deeper levels, known to be moderately modernized and technologically advanced and always meant to purify the vibration of all those, who believe in community health promotion. INFRASTRUCTURE :

The main office of MPVHA is located at Indore and the Project Offices are setup in project areas as and when required. Offices are well equipped with basic amenities, required to run it in a professional manner.

MANAGEMENT :

The organization is governed by a 9 member team, elected by the General House, known as the Governing Board of the Association. The Governing Board is assisted by two committees i.e. Program Advisory and a Finance Committee. The Governing Board of MPVHA meets from time to time, to review, suggest new changes, steer the activities and to take policy decisions, to achieve the objectives of the Association. The Executive Director of MPVHA is the **Chief Executive**, responsible for execution of all the affairs and activities, including day-to-day administration. He is also an Ex-officio member of the Governing Board and one of the signatories for bank operations.

MPVHA TEAM :

MPVHA's team includes a wide range of professionals, such as Medical Professionals, Social Workers, Trainers, Finance & Accounts persons and Administrative staff. The organization has multicultural setting, in which staff members belonging to varied fields and expertise, are rendering their services (full as well as part time). The organization has a well-defined HR, finance, other policies like PSEA, Child Protection etc. The staffs working in MPVHA has a long experience varying from 2 to 30 years, in health and other development sectors.

AREAS OF EXPERTISE :

1. **Training and Capacity Building:** It is one of the core areas of the organization. MPVHA is involved in building capacity of top, middle & front line functionaries of voluntary & Govt. organizations on health, development and enforcement of Laws.
2. **Liaison & Networking:** Conscious efforts are being made towards strengthening its network by involving like minded groups, health & non health organizations, individuals & other important national and international agencies for health & development.
3. **Facilitation and Campaign on important issues:** It has been an integral approach in its five decades of health promotion, for making people more observant and conscious towards their health needs and rights.

Chapter 1

EYE CARE

India was the first country in the world to launch the National Program for Control of Blindness in 1976 with the goal to reduce the prevalence of blindness from 1.4% (1974) to 0.3% by the year 2020 by developing eye care infrastructure human resources, improving accessibility quality of eye care services. Our country has handled it in a very systematic manner and the estimated 12 million people suffering from blindness in the year 2006 has come down to 5 million in the current year. Other major causes of blindness include refractive errors, glaucoma, corneal blindness, childhood blindness and age related muscular degeneration. Approximately 80 % of blindness and low vision in our country is avoidable, meaning it can be prevented or treated with the right interventions.

India has also witnessed a demographic transformation over the past 40 years with life expectancy increasing to 68.8 years (2017) from 52.3 years (1977) with improved survival rates. and ageing of its population with the estimated population aged > 60 years projected to increase from 8% in 2010 to 19% by 2050. This has a significant impact on current and future eye care challenges as more than 80% of blindness and visual impairment is age-related. Cataract blindness load is among the highest in India.

About 70 percent of Cataract surgery in the country is performed in the private voluntary sector and 30 percent in government sector. In the city Indore it is about 80 percent of cataract surgery performed by the private voluntary sector.

1. Amrita Drishti Urban Eye Health Program (UEH)

Being a Health & Developmental organization, MPVHA is extending support to the Department of Health and local Administration in eye care programme in Indore for the past 9 years with the support of Sightsavers & Fullerton India Credit Company Ltd.

Under this project, MPVHA mobile vision centre “Nayan Mitra” reaches the urban slums and provides its services to the people who are marginalized/underserved/unreached. The identified cataract patient's referred to hospital for their surgery. Major focus of the project are:

1. Facilitate uptake of eye health services by improving health seeking behaviours amongst urban poor through sensitizing community based groups demanding quality eye health services.
2. Ensure provision of quality, affordable and convenient eye health services by strengthening the urban public health system through referrals and extending their hands for the urban poor.
3. Facilitate improved community and policy environment through building capacity of urban local bodies for improved coordination among health and urban local bodies through advocacy.

Following Activities carried out during the period

1. Mobile vision centre reached to the urban slums of Indore city and provided its services in forms of Vision Screening, Refraction, Cataract identification, Referrals, Counselling and providing spectacles to the needy.



2. Liaison and Networking done with Corporate, Community Based Organizations, Old Age Homes, Local Leaders etc. for extending services to the underprivileged people of community.
3. Community Awareness done by distribution of Handouts, IPC, and outreach by the field staff.
4. Regular liaison with Authorities especially Health & Administration is being done to keep them informed.

Qualitative output :

- Services provided by the Mobile Van helped in early detection of eye problems. On spot eye screening and providing near vision spectacles to the people who are suffering from vision.
- It is contributing in treatment and reduction of problems of blindness in the district and state.
- Poor women who were unable to reach hospital for treatment of eye got opportunity to go through eye test at their door.
- After screened persons who were identified of cataract were referred for cataract surgeries.

2. National Truckers Programme for Eye Health "RAHI" Drishti Kendra

This is the 5th year of the implementation of the "RAHI" project. This project is exclusively for the Truckers/Helpers in the city of Indore. The project is being supported by Sightsavers, Bhopal.

In India 65% goods are transported through roads by 90 lakh truck drivers and transporters. To keep the roads safe, it is necessary that the vision of truck drivers and cleaners should remain healthy in terms of visibility. The trucker's Fleet that follows a more difficult lifestyle pattern, pertaining to their task of operating across long distances (at night), without taking sufficient rest, calls for urgent eye health interventions.



The major challenges observed that the truck drivers do not take care of their eye health, neither go for glasses against their refractive errors, as this requires sufficient time and quality services readily available nearby them. The current intervention is designed to reach out to the maximum number of individuals according to their feasibility. For this, centre based as well as an outreach camp based approach was adopted and services were delivered.

Activities conducted by the Static Vision Centre

A. Services of the RAAHI Vision Centre

RAAHI Vision centre is situated at Transport Nagar, Indore, where trucks and other heavy vehicles move frequently. The following services are provided by "RAAHI" centre.

1. Vision Screening 2. Slit Lamp Examination 3. Refraction 4. Old Spectacles Examination, 5. Glaucoma 6. Diabetes Examination 7. Blood Pressure 8. Body Weight 9. Cataract identification and referrals 10. Provision of Spectacles (Near & Distant Vision)

Chapter 2

CAPACITY BUILDING

Capacity building can include training, mentoring, coaching, technical assistance, networking and resource mobilization etc. Basically capacity building is a process of empowering individuals, organizations and communities through providing knowledge and skills to improve their decision making abilities and achieve their goal. Capacity building can occur at various levels, can cover a wide range of areas and subjects. Capacity building is one of the core areas of MPVHA from its inception.

1 : Modular Training of ASHA (Accredited Social Health Activist)

One of the key components of NHM is to provide every village with a trained female health activist i.e. ASHA have been engaged under the mission for establishing a link between the community and the health system. ASHA is the first port of call for any health related demands of deprived sections of the population, especially women and children, who find it difficult to access health services in rural areas.

Capacity building of ASHA is being viewed as a continuous process. ASHA have to undergo series of training episodes to acquire necessary knowledge, skill and confidence for performing her spelled out roles. Like the previous years, this year too. M.P. Voluntary Health Association was given the responsibility by the Department of Health and Family Welfare Govt of MP through its District Health Society, Khargone for conducting ASHA trainings. [E-Home based care for Children (E-HBYC)- 03, Non-Communicable Disease (NCD)-8. Home based care for Children (HBYC)-10, ASHA Facilitator (AF)-3, 2-1, 3-2, 4-2.

Chapter 3

GENDER AND DECLINING CHILD SEX RATIO

Preference for the male child, has been one of the most evident manifestations of gender discrimination in our society. With the advancement in medical science and technology, sex selection has moved from female infanticide to sex selective abortions or female foeticide. Despite gains in education, longevity and income for some groups of women, large sections of Indian Society still consider daughters as a liability and are apparently stopping down to any level in order to avert their birth. No doubt awareness, monitoring and enforcement of law is gradually making impact and positive results are coming from different districts. Awareness, education and employment of women is helpful in improving the status of girl child but the other gender related new problems are cropping up therefore PCPNDT (Pre-Conception and Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques Act-1994) must be addressed in relation to gender and violence.

The law provides for the establishment of regulating authorities in each state and the central government to ensure compliance and enforcement of the act. The law has been amended from time to time to strengthen its provisions and improve enforcement. Despite these efforts, sex-selective abortions continue to occur in India, posing a significant challenge to the effective implementation of the PC&PNDT Act.

Sincere efforts made by MPVHA in collaboration with State and District Administration, Department of Health (PCPNDT Cell). From time to time MPVHA efforts have been recognized by State and District Appropriate Authorities, which is one of the motivating factors that forced the team to continue with the efforts without funding.

Activities organized

- 1. Gender and Pre-Conception & Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques:** MPVHA in collaboration with District Administration and Department of Health & Family Welfare, GoMP initiated and continued its efforts to address the issue in a systematic manner. Orientations, meetings, distribution of IEC material, strengthening of PC & PNDT advisory committee, training of monitoring team, monitoring of USG Centres and collective liaison with the appropriate authority, were the main components.
- 2. Efforts in Indore District:** MPVHA as an active member of PC & PNDT Advisory Committee has played a vital role in extending the hands of the Appropriate Authority in terms of building the capacity of law enforcers, mobilizing the community and strengthening the monitoring system.
- 3. Support as Resource Organization to the State and other districts:** MPVHA as a resource organization extended support to other districts as and when required by the State Authority, District Collectors and Regional Joint Directors (Health).
- 4. Monitoring & Appraisal of centers:** Helping the appropriate authority in appraisal of new centers/applicants and also doing routine monitoring of USG, MRI and CT Scan in the city, as a member of monitoring team formed by the government.

Chapter 4

NUTRITION & FORTIFICATION

The Iron deficiency is most common nutritional disorder in India affecting particularly to the vulnerable population. The recent results of the NFHS – 5 also indicates that the Anaemia is a severe public health problem in India. As more than 50% pregnant women are affected with anaemia and contributing to the maternal mortality rate and low weight birth. The total population of Madhya Pradesh is 8.33 Crore spread across 52 districts which consist of 313 blocks, as per the projected population in 2020. The prevalence of anaemia is particularly high among women of reproductive age (15 to 49 years) i.e. 54.7% and 72.7 % in children as per the National Family Health Survey-5 (2019 - 21).

To address the issue of anaemia among the population, The State Government has taken several initiatives including food fortification programs. The Government of Madhya Pradesh (GoMP) introduced Double Fortified Salt (DFS) in 89 tribal blocks of 20 tribal districts at INR 1 per kg through the Public Distribution System with the technical support of Nutrition International (NI) and its implementing partner Madhya Pradesh Voluntary Health Association (MPVHA). Subsequently program scaled up in across 52 districts of Madhya Pradesh in Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), District Hospitals (DH), and Nutrition Rehabilitation Centres (NRCs) from September 2021.

1 : Double Fortified Salt and Fortified Rice Program in Madhya Pradesh

From April 2022 onward MPVHA extending close technical & implementing support in rolling out the Double Fortified Salt Program across the state in 180 blocks spread in 37 districts and Fortified Rice Program in 52 districts through PDS, Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), Mid-day Meal (MDM), Tribal Welfare Department (TWD), District Hospitals (DH) and Nutrition Rehabilitation Centres. Fortified Rice is being in supply through the PDS to the NFSA beneficiaries and SSNPs in all the 8 aspirational districts of Madhya Pradesh i.e., Barwani, Chhatarpur, Damoh, Guna, Khandwa, Singrauli, Rajgarh and Vidisha.

M. P. Voluntary Health Association is working in all the Divisional, District, block and extending support to the government in the execution of all the feasible activities to strengthen the program by engaging the key stakeholders in a strategic partnership to establish the processes, integrate the monitoring and reporting mechanism, improve supply chain management, capacity building and behaviour change communications.

Overall objective of the project

1. To support the Government of Madhya Pradesh in increasing the coverage and improving the quality of food fortification programs.
2. To support the Government of Madhya Pradesh in scale up and improved quality of fortified staples (Double Fortified Salt and Fortified Rice) through SSNPs across the state.
3. To support the Government of Madhya Pradesh in further improving the coverage and quality of Double Fortified Salt program through SSNPs across the state.
4. To support the Government of Madhya Pradesh in further improving the quality and sustaining the coverages of rice fortification through SSNPs across the state.

Chapter 5

TOBACCO CONTROL

A ccording to the most recent GYTS (Global Youth Tobacco Survey) Report 2019 conducted by Gol among the children aged between 13-15 years, 3.9% of students (4.4% boys and 3.5% girls) in MP currently use tobacco products. This is alarming that a large percentage of young children are using tobacco at an early age. Reason, they get attracted towards the surrogate/ misleading advertisements, glamorization, easily available products, peer pressure etc. Tobacco use by the children is the first step heading towards drug abuse (Nasha). There is an urgent need to save our children from the tobacco epidemic through awareness, strengthening monitoring and enforcement of law.

The Global Adult Tobacco Survey (GATS II-2016) says that 34.2% of adults in MP consume tobacco in one form or other. Govt. of India has made The Cigarette and other Tobacco Products (Prohibition of Advertisement and Regulation of Trade and Commerce, Production, Supply and Distribution) Act" (COTPA), 2003. However the availability and accessibility of cheap, unregulated, and illicit tobacco products continue to be a significant challenge for tobacco control in the country. In recent years, the Indian government has taken further steps to strengthen tobacco control measures, including the cessation centers and the ban on electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS) such as e-cigarettes.

The Government of India's National Tobacco Control Programme (NTCP) supports advancing the provision laid down in India's tobacco control act (COTPA, 2003) through the State Tobacco Control Cell (STCC) and District Tobacco Control Cells (DTCCs). GATS-2 results shows that efforts have been made by the state government and a decline of 5.3 percent points has taken place - from 39.5% (in 2008-9) to 34.2% (2016-17) in overall tobacco consumption in MP which needs further push and support by different stakeholders.

MPVHA has always extended the hands of the government, especially the health department and administration for the effective implementation of the National Tobacco Control Program to protect the people from ill effect of tobacco use.

1: Strengthen and Sustain Tobacco Control through capacity building, effective legislation, M&E and stopping TI Interference in Madhya Pradesh, India.

MPVHA is doing a project title : **"Strengthen and Sustain Tobacco Control through capacity building, effective legislation, M&E and stopping TI interference in Madhya Pradesh, India"** with the support of International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease (The Union-Bloomberg) further extended support from Vital Strategies in collaboration with Department of Health, State Tobacco Control Cell, Administration, Police and other various departments. The following activities were organized during the reporting period.

1: District Level Workshops:

5 District Level Sensitization Workshops (Satna, Singrauli, Anuppur, Shahdol, Umaria) organized under the chair of the District Collectors, participated by district officials from department of health, police, panchayat, administration, school, municipal corporation / municipality etc. A total of 309 officials were sensitized and oriented. These activities helped in enhancing cooperation among various departments and stakeholders.



2: Capacity Building

- A: Orientation of Police officers:** Exclusive orientation program organized at Bhopal in collaboration with the the Police Commissionerate, attended by 20 Town Inspectors & 20 Sub Inspectors from 20 Urban Police Stations. They were explained about their role in tobacco control including enforcement of COTPA-2003. The orientation was chaired by Police Commissioner and District Collector, Bhopal.
- B: Orientation at Academy of Administration:** Two orientation program at the RCVN Naronha Academy of Administration in Bhopal were conducted, attended by newly recruited officials of State Administrative Service. The purpose was to orient young officials and deepen their understanding on COTPA-2003 and on National Tobacco Control Program (NTCP). Total 195 officials attended the program.
- C: Orientation of Civil Societies and Law Enforcers:** State-Level orientation on "Tobacco Epidemic & Tobacco Control Laws" for Civil Societies & Law Enforcers was conducted together in Bhopal in collaboration with the Health Department & Urban Police Bhopal. A large number of senior ranking government officials and 45 civil society organization from 40 district attended the program. The purpose was to enhance the collaboration at the district level with Civil Societies and Police department. The program was attended by Mission Director, National Health Mission, DCP Police, Bhopal, Commissioner, Women & Child Development, District Collector, Bhopal and The Union representatives as resource persons.
- D: Orientation of District Prosecution Officers:** 5 Orientation programs were organized in which DPO's from 7 districts participated and were sensitized to extend their legal support. A total of 131 DPO's attended the program.
- E: Training of Law Enforcers:** 7 district level trainings were organized in 7 districts (Shahdol, Umaria, Anuppur, Sidhi, Rewa, Satna, Singrauli). Total 254 law enforcers of various departments got extensive training with the help of experts and training manuals. This resulted into the rapid increase in enforcement in the state.
- F: Training of Block enforcement officials:** Total 37 trainings in 37 blocks of Rewa and Shahdol division were organized which were chaired by SDM's, CEO Janpad Panchayat in which 1233 block level officials were trained on various issues related to tobacco control including COTPA 2003.
- G: Orientation of Panchayat Secretaries:** Total 15 programs were organized in 15 blocks in which 1137 panchayat representatives were oriented on various issues related to tobacco control.
- 3: News Coverage:** There were wide coverage of news in print media and social media platforms including the public relation website of government.

4: Special Efforts

On the occasion of "Republic Day", 26 January 2024, MPVHA facilitated panchayat representatives to initiate Tobacco-Free villages concept at the Gram Sabha sessions. Five Gram Panchayats of Rewa and Shahdol district declared compliant with the COTPA-2003 witnessed by a large number of people such as elderly persons, teachers, panchayat representatives, block authorities, and panchayat people. Official declaration made by the Sarpanch. Although the number was 5 but has created many paths to other panchayats to come forward.

5: Observation of World No Tobacco Day (31st May 2023)

With the theme “We Need Food, Not Tobacco” declared by WHO, “World No Tobacco Day 2023” was observed in entire state. Apart from the intervention districts, MPVHA field staff from various projects & NGOs associated with MPVHA, facilitated activities and supported Health Department, Social Justice & Empowerment Department, Police Department, Urban Administration (Municipal Corporation/Municipality), Education Department in 33 districts covering a population of approx. 30 Lakh people. The activities/events organized from district to village level & reached community at grass root. MPVHA helped the State Tobacco Control Cell in designing the thematic banner which was used by various district authorities & stakeholders.

- MD NHM issued a letter (No./NHM/NTCP/2023/337, dated 25 May 2023) to all the CMHOs and Civil Surgeons for a fortnight campaign to observe “World No Tobacco Day, 31st May 2023” with allocation of budget.

Chapter 6

Tuberculosis (TB) and Tobacco

Tuberculosis (TB) and tobacco use represent a challenging and deadly comorbidity that plagues both individuals and healthcare systems worldwide. TB, an infectious disease primarily affecting the lungs, has been exacerbated by the detrimental effects of tobacco consumption. Tobacco weakens the immune system and damages the respiratory tract, making individuals more susceptible to TB infection and less capable of fighting the disease. To combat this comorbidity, it is crucial to implement comprehensive strategies that not only address TB diagnosis and treatment but also emphasize tobacco control and cessation efforts to break the lethal synergy between these two health crises. The combined impact of TB and tobacco in India imposes significant mortalities. The various findings from research studies stated the subsequent key points:

- Tobacco use emerges as a primary (modifiable) risk factor for various non-communicable and communicable diseases, including **Tuberculosis**.
- **38%** of TB-related deaths are linked to tobacco use.
- The prevalence of TB is **three times** higher among smokers compared to non-smokers.
- Mortality rates from TB are **three to four times higher** among smokers compared to non-smokers.
- TB patients who also use tobacco experience **delayed** recovery and face a higher risk of **TB relapse**.
- Smoking contributes to **50%** of male deaths in the 25-69 age group from TB in India.

The Brief Advice Counselling Technique (BACT) comes highly recommended by both the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Government of India as a cost-effective yet impact full method for tobacco cessation. According to pilot studies conducted in Gujarat, 67% of TB patients successfully quit tobacco use after receiving counselling through BACT. The essence of brief advice involves incorporating the 5As and 5Rs, which stand for Ask, Advice, Assess, Assist, Arrange, Relevance, Risks, Rewards, Roadblocks and Repetition.

MPVHA implemented the project titled **Integration of Brief Advice Counselling on Tobacco Cessation for the Registered TB patients in 03 districts (Indore, Dhar & Jhabua) of Indore Division, Madhya Pradesh** in Collaboration with Department of Health & Family Welfare, Madhya Pradesh Supported by World Health Organization (WHO) during **27th September 2023 to 13th December 2023**. The primary focus of the project was to integrate and make **Brief Advice Counselling Technique (BACT)** mandatory at the service delivery point for TB patients and capacity building of the DOTS providers.

1: Activities organized

- 1: Development of IEC material like Ready reference kit for Officials and Handouts for Community and DOTS providers.
- 2: Liaison at State/Divisional level and within intervention districts.
- 3: Procurement of orders and directives for integrating BACT at TB service delivery points at state and district level for smooth functioning of the project.

Experience Gained

- However, the project period was of 90 days but within a span of 60 days scheduled activities were conducted with active involvement of the government officials and service providers of TB and Tobacco Control program, despite festive season and legislative election in the State.
- This initiative with the support of WHO has created many paths for further intervention and given a solid platform for BACT introduction.
- Although is too early to see the impact and outcome as the project period was too short but the introduction of Brief Advice Counselling Technique in the three intervention districts were made through MPVHA efforts.

Report from field on BACT Counselling:

- 714 TB patients were notified in the months of November and December 2023 in Dhar District and out of which 23 patients declared themselves as tobacco users. All the TB patients were oriented on harms of Tobacco use and the tobacco user patients were counselled by 5A technique and linked to local TCC.
- 658 TB patients were notified in the months of November and December 2023 in Jhabua district and out of which 13 patients declared themselves as Tobacco users. All the TB patients were oriented on harms of Tobacco use and the tobacco user patients were counselled by 5A technique and linked to local TCC.
- 528 TB patients were notified in the month of December 2023 in Indore district and out of which 8 patients declared themselves as tobacco user. All the TB patients were oriented on harms of Tobacco use and the tobacco user patients were counselled by 5A technique and linked to local TCC.

Chapter 7

SERVICES TO POOR

M PVHA with the support of Wend Collective continuously helping the economically weaker section of the society. The following activities have been organized during the reporting period. I am really thankful to my team members, volunteers, senior citizens for their commitment, cooperation and WEND collective for their kind support.

1. **Support to Mentally Challenged Vulnerable and Marginalized Women:** These women are the most vulnerable and marginalized population who normally don't get support well in time despite provisions in laws. Our team with the support of Wend Collective visited to their centers, at Indore Extended support to enhance their living conditions through providing essential daily items at their centers, and promote conducive environment for their well being and dignified life. The items, such as bedding, crockery, utensils and other necessities required for daily living provided under the guidance of mentor, witnessed by the senior citizens, officials, representatives and medical professional.
2. Lab test support was also extended to all such women staying at centres, Medical test the women requested to extend the support for their medical check-up and various tests at genuine laboratories. We are thankful to the Lab & doctors for doing tests at lowest price to these women. Total 23 mentally ill / challenged women, their blood, urine, BP, Sugar etc. were tested, and reports submitted for further medical help.
3. **Ambulance:** Ambulance extending support in terms of transportation of poor, needy and old citizens on their request.
4. **Awareness and IEC:** From time to time the ambulance is also used for awareness and educational activities. It is also used to observe health days too in the city for mass awareness.

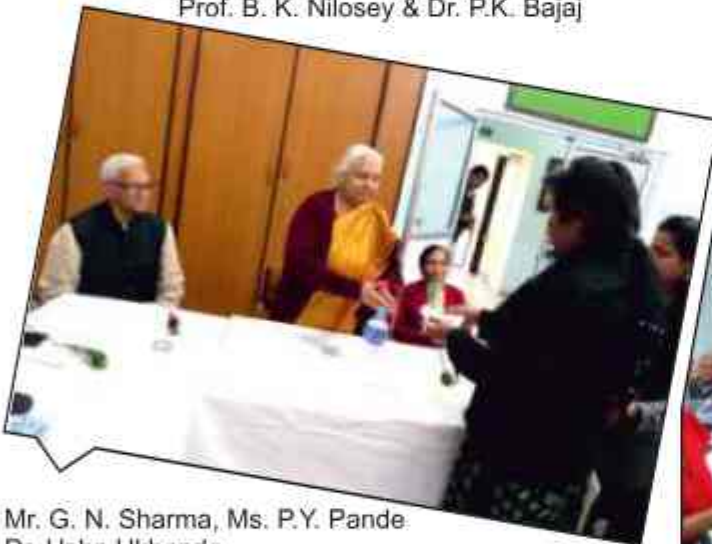

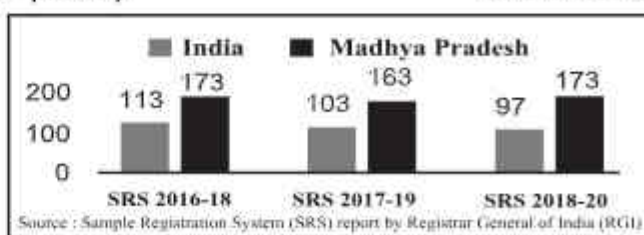

NOTES:

1. **Basic Information**
MPVHA is a charitable society registered under the Madhya Pradesh Societies Registration Act, 1973 having registered number 3922 dated: 05-09-1974
2. **Significant accounting policies:**
 1. **Basis of accounting and preparation of financial statements**
The financial statements of the society have been prepared in accordance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India (Indian GAAP) to comply with the Accounting Standards notified by the Government as applicable to charitable societies. The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis under the historical cost convention. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those followed in the previous year.
 2. **Use of estimates**
The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Indian GAAP requires the Management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the reported income and expenses during the year. The Management believes that the estimates used in preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Future results could differ due to these estimates and the differences between the actual results and the estimates are recognised in the periods in which the results are known / materialise.
 3. **Cash flow statement**
Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit / (loss) before extraordinary items and tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the society are segregated based on the available information.
 4. **Fixed Assets**
Fixed assets are recorded at the historical cost at which it is incurred. Addition to the fixed assets are totally written off in the income and expenditure account as Non-Recurring Expenses in the year in which it is incurred.
 5. **Fixed Assets - contd.**
To show the fixed assets in Balance Sheet, a contra entry is passed in the books Debiting respective fixed asset on the assets side and crediting a memorandum account Fixed Assets Fund (Contra) on the liability side of the Balance Sheet. Any sale / transfer / alienation of property shall be done by reducing the amount from both fixed assets and Fixed Asset Fund account in both the sides of the Balance Sheet.
 6. **Depreciation and amortisation**
The society is not charging Depreciation on fixed assets and whenever an asset is sold or transferred it is reduced at its original cost
 7. **Revenue recognition - Grants**
Income of the society is by way of grants and interest. Grants are recognised as income based on the agreement with the donor agencies. Grant which is not received during the year but is receivable is shown as Grant receivable in current assets.
 8. **Other income**
Interest income is accounted on accrual basis.
 10. **Intangible assets**
There is no intangible asset during the reporting period.
 11. **Taxes on income**
The society is registered under Section 12Aa of the Income Tax Act and has tax exemption subject to the conditions stipulated therein. Hence no provision has been made for income tax in the books of account.
 12. **Books of Account**
The society maintains different books for account for each project (both FC and local contributions. At the end of the financial year, separate Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt and Payment Account are prepared for each project. All FC projects are consolidated into one consolidated FC Financial Statement and all local projects are consolidated into one consolidated Local Financial statements. Finally a consolidated FC+LC Balance Sheet is prepared.

Executive Summary



We are pleased to present Madhya Pradesh Voluntary Health Association's (MPVHA) Annual Report for the year 2024-25. This document reflects our commitment to improving public health outcomes across the state of Madhya Pradesh, especially among the most vulnerable and underserved populations. The year 2024-25 has been marked by significant achievements and impactful collaborations across several critical areas of public health. MPVHA believes working closely with the system and always extends the hands of the government in implementation of various health programs.

In the domains of Nutrition and Food Fortification, it focused on reducing malnutrition through implementation of fortified food program, nutrition education, to supplement the government programs. Effort included Capacity Building, Facilitation to the government, Monitoring and quality improvement. Our campaign have enhanced awareness regarding importance of consuming Fortified Rice and Double Fortified Salt.

In the area of Adolescent Health, MPVHA has expanded its outreach to address the unique physical and mental health needs of young people. With the support of National Health Mission (NHM) we have been implementing Rashtriya Kishore Swasthya Karyakram (RKSK) through targeted interventions. Counselling, Capacity-Building, Increased access to adolescent-friendly services, Empowering of youth to make informed health choices and advocate for their own well-being, were the major areas of our interventions.

Our efforts in Tobacco Control have continued to gain momentum, with sustained awareness campaigns, community mobilization, and policy level interventions leading to institutionalization of National Tobacco Control Program and strengthening enforcement of Indian Tobacco Control Act, Hookah Bar ban, E Cigarette Ban and greater public consciousness about the dangers of tobacco use.

We have been supporting State Immunization Cell (NHM) in ensuring greater coverage and equity, particularly in hard-to-reach areas. MPVHA has worked tirelessly to build community trust, dispel myths, and improve immunization uptake, contributing to better protection against preventable diseases.

Gender equity and the challenge of the Declining Child Sex Ratio remain key priorities for MPVHA. MPVHA AT A GLANCE

Madhya Pradesh Voluntary Health Association (MPVHA) is one of the largest health & developmental network of NGOs in the state. It came in existence in 1973, to meet the health needs of the people and to enhance their role in health promotion and development. MPVHA strives to fulfil its vision of "Holistic Health and Health a Reality for All" by ensuring active participation and involvement of people of the state.

In its 53 year - long journey, it took up several challenges to strengthen the voluntary health movement and to promote community health in the state. From health to community health, community health to women's health, women's health to women's rights, whatever terms used from time to time, the focus always remained over women, adolescents and children, with special emphasis on weaker, marginalized & vulnerable section of the society.

LEGAL STATUS AND FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT :

MPVHA is registered as a secular, non-political and non-profit making organization, under Society's Registration Act XXI of 1860. The organization has also been registered under Section 12-A and 80-G of Income Tax Act, EPF, TDS and Foreign Contribution Regulation Act (FCRA). It is also registered under "NITI Aayog" Darpan Portal of Government of India.



PRESENCE IN THE STATE:

It has its presence in almost all districts of MP, either through its large network of member voluntary organizations (includes community & rural development organizations, women organizations, hospitals, dispensaries & health centers) or through various projects in different geographical areas of Madhya Pradesh.

INFRASTRUCTURE:

The main office of MPVHA is located at Indore and the Project Offices are setup in project areas as and when required. Offices are well equipped with basic amenities, required to run it in a professional manner.

MANAGEMENT:

The organization is governed by a 9 member team, elected by the General House, known as the Governing Board of the Association. The Governing Board is assisted by two committees i.e. Program Advisory and a Finance Committee. The Governing Board of MPVHA meets from time to time, to review, suggest new changes, steer the activities and to take policy decisions, in order to achieve the desired goal of the Association. The Executive Director of MPVHA is the Chief Executive, responsible for execution of all the affairs and activities, including day-to-day administration. He is also an Ex-officio member of the Governing Board and one of the signatories for bank operations.



MPVHA TEAM :

MPVHA's team includes a wide range of professionals, such as Medical Professionals, Social Workers, Trainers, Finance & Accounts persons and Administrative staff. The organization has multicultural setting, in which staff members belonging to varied fields and expertise, are rendering their services (full as well as part time). The organization has a well-defined HR and finance policy. The staffs working in MPVHA has a long experience varying from 2 to 30 years, in health and other development sectors.

AREAS OF EXPERTISE :

1. **Training and Capacity Building:** It is one of the core areas of the organization. MPVHA is involved in building capacity of top, middle & front line functionaries of voluntary & Govt. organizations on health, development and enforcement of Laws.
2. **Liaison & Networking:** Conscious efforts are being made towards strengthening its network by involving like minded groups, health & non health organizations, individuals & other important national and international agencies for health & development.
3. **Facilitation and Campaign on important issues:** It has been an integral approach in its five decades of health promotion, for making people more observant and conscious towards their health needs and rights.
4. **Community Mobilization:** This is a continuous process in which MPVHA is involved through member organizations and its innovative projects.
5. **Information Dissemination:** Large number of need based publications like newsletters, booklets, training manuals, posters, stickers have been produced, which has been acknowledged & used by both Govt. & civil societies. Latest technologies have also been integrated for Information & Dissemination.
6. Implementation of innovative health & developmental projects in urban & rural pockets of the state.

Blindness continues to be a pressing public health issue in India. As per "National Blindness and Visual Impairment Survey" India (2015-19), prevalence of blindness in all age groups is 0.36% and prevalence of blindness in population aged ≥ 50 years is 1.99%. Major cause of blindness in 50 years and above age group is cataract which is 66.2% and in the age group of 0-49 years it is corneal opacity which is 37.5%. In case of visual impairment major causes of visual impairment in population aged ≥ 50 years is cataract which is 71.2 % and in the age group of 0-49 years it is Refractive error which is 29.6%. The survey showed reduction in the prevalence of blindness from 1% (2007) to 0.36% (2019).

National Programme for Control of Blindness was launched in 1976. From 2017 onwards, the programme was strengthened and expanded to cover all kinds of visual impairment as well. It was renamed as National Programme for Control of Blindness and Visual Impairment (NPCB&VI) and is implemented all over the country uniformly, with a goal of reducing the prevalence of avoidable blindness to 0.25% by the year 2025. Cataract remains the leading cause of preventable blindness in the country.

1. Amrita Drishti Urban Eye Health Program (UEH)

Recognizing the urgency, MPVHA, in collaboration with Sightsavers and SMFG India Credit, has been supporting the Department of Health and the local administration in Indore through the Amrita Drishti Urban Eye Health Programme. The initiative focuses on reaching underserved urban slum populations through a Mobile Vision Centre, which conducts community-based eye screenings and facilitates access to treatment and surgeries.

Project Objectives

1. Improve Eye Health-Seeking Behaviour among Urban Poor.
2. Facilitate and strengthen Urban Public Eye Health Services.
3. Build Capacity and Foster Policy Engagement for Eye Care

In order to achieve the above objectives regular and continued efforts made to have a qualitative and quantitative achievements.

Qualitative Outcomes

Early Detection: Mobile screening enabled early and timely identification of vision problems which helped in reduction of complications caused due to delayed diagnosis.

Community Impact: Sensitization and awareness significantly raised demand for quality eye health services at the grassroots level.

Referrals: Helped greater accessibility to affordable quality eye care for the poor and marginalized.

Collaboration: Efforts led to better coordination between urban health systems and local governance and has helped in building the supportive environment for long-term eye care integration in public health.

Beneficiaries : Thousands of marginalized individuals, particularly women, received spectacles and access to cataract surgeries.

Conclusion : The Amrita Drishti UEH Programme has been playing vital role in abridging eye health care gaps in Indore. This model can be scaled and adapted across other urban regions to address preventable blindness and contribute toward national eye health goals.

2. National Truckers Programme for Eye Health “RAAHI” Drishti Kendra

This is the fifth year of the implementation of the “RAHI” project. This project is exclusively for the Truckers/Helpers those who are involved in long driving. The project is being supported by Sightsavers, Bhopal and being implemented through MPVHA at Transport Nagar, Indore.

In India 65% goods are transported through roads by 90 lakh truck drivers and transporters. To keep the roads safe, it is necessary that the vision of truck drivers and cleaners should remain healthy in terms of visibility. The trucker's Fleet that follows a more difficult lifestyle pattern, pertaining to their task of operating across long distances (at night), without taking sufficient rest, calls for urgent eye health interventions.

The major challenges observed that the truck drivers do not take care of their eye health, neither go for glasses against their refractive errors, as this requires sufficient time and quality services readily available nearby them. The current phase is designed to reach out to the maximum number of individuals according to their feasibility. For this, centre based approach in terms of well-equipped Vision centre in Transport Nagar and along with outreach camp based approach were adopted to cater the eye health care needs of this specific group. The services made available to the truck yards and stopping points.

Services of the RAAHI Vision Centre

RAAHI Vision centre is situated at Transport Nagar, Indore, where trucks and other heavy vehicles are parked for a short while and further move frequently to reach their long destination. The following services were provided under "RAAHI" project.

1:Slit Lamp Examination 2. Vision Screening 3. Refraction 4. Old Spectacles Examination, 5. Glaucoma 6. Diabetes Examination 7. Blood Pressure 8. Body Weight 9. Cataract identification & referrals 10. Provision of Spectacles (Near & Distant Vision).

Training of Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHA)

The National Health Mission (NHM) strives to ensure universal access to equitable, affordable, and quality healthcare services. The major component of this NHM is the Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHA) program, which empowers women health workers to serve as the primary link between rural communities and the public healthcare system.

ASHA workers play a pivotal role, particularly in reaching marginalized populations, women, and children in remote areas. Their involvement has significantly improved access to outpatient care, institutional deliveries, diagnostic services, and inpatient treatments, revitalizing the public health system in rural India.

To strengthen the effectiveness of ASHA workers, the NHM emphasizes continuous capacity building through structured training programs. In line with this objective, M.P. Voluntary Health Association was entrusted by the Department of Health and Family Welfare, Government of Madhya Pradesh, through the District Health Society, Khargone, to conduct ASHA trainings during the year 2024–25.

ASHA Training Summary (2024–25)

A total of 18 training rounds were organized with the help of state and district level key trainers in Khargone covering various modules including NCD (Non-Communicable Diseases), MNS (Mental Health and Nutrition Services), HBYC (Home-Based Young Child Care), and others.

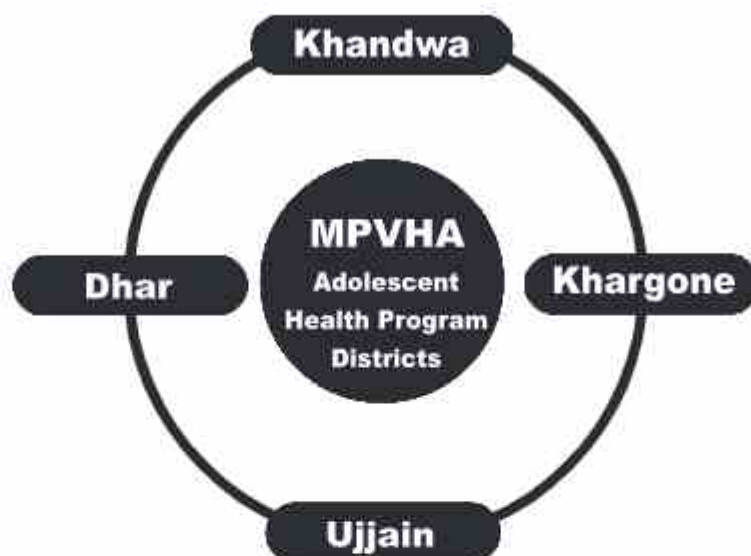

Government of India has recognized the importance of influencing health-seeking behavior of adolescents. The health situation of this age group is a key determinant of India's overall health, mortality, morbidity and population growth scenario. In order to ensure holistic development of adolescent population, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare launched Rashtriya Kishor Swasthya Karyakram (RKSK) on 7th January 2014 to reach out to 253 million adolescents - male and female, rural and urban, married and unmarried, in and out-of-school adolescents with special focus on marginalized and underserved groups. The programme expands the scope of adolescent health programming in India - from being limited to sexual and reproductive health, it now includes in its ambit nutrition, injuries and violence (including gender based violence), non-communicable diseases, mental health and substance misuse. The strength of the program is its health promotion approach. It is a paradigm shift from the existing clinic-based services to promotion and prevention and reaching adolescents in their own environment, such as in schools, families and communities. Key drivers of the program are community based interventions like, outreach by counselors; facility based counselling; Social and Behavior Change Communication; and strengthening of Adolescent Friendly Health Clinics across levels of care.

In Madhya Pradesh the government (NHM) has expanded RKSK program in all the districts in the year 2024 with integration of Sathiya program in 21 districts. MPVHA has been given the responsibility by NHM to implement the RKSK program in four districts i.e Dhar, Ujjain, Khandwa and Khargone.



Strategy is to implement through 1: Facility based, 2:Community based and 3:School based approach

Target : The target age group of the RKSK program is all adolescent boys and girls between 10 and 19 years of age.

Activities carried out

MPVHA is providing counselling services in 35 Adolescent Friendly Health Clinics (AFHC) in four districts which further supported by outreach counseling session on Tuesday and Friday in government schools, tribal hostels and anganwadi centers covering following areas:

- Physical, mental & sexual health,
- Healthy diet and lifestyle for adolescents.
- Family planning information and services.
- Promoting mental health among adolescents.
- Cleanliness drives, safety on the street support.
- NCD, Substance abuse etc.

Tobacco consumption continues to pose a major public health challenge in India, contributing to a range of serious health issues including cancer, cardiovascular disease, and respiratory disorders. For over 25 years, the Madhya Pradesh Voluntary Health Association (MPVHA) has been actively engaged in advancing tobacco control efforts across the state MP. Started with public awareness, sensitization of officials and stakeholders. Later on made effort to institutionalize the tobacco control program and facilitate the government in implementation of National Tobacco Control Program and support the enforcement of Indian Tobacco Control Act COTPA 2003 in collaboration with various government departments.

The Global Adult Tobacco Survey (GATS II-2016) says that 34.2% of adults in MP consume tobacco in one form or other. According to the most recent GYTS (Global Youth Tobacco Survey) Report 2019 conducted by GoI among the children aged between 13-15 years, 3.9% of students (4.4% boys and 3.5% girls) in MP currently use tobacco products. This is alarming that a large percentage of young children are using tobacco at an early age. Reason, they get attracted towards the surrogate/ misleading advertisements, glamorization, easily available products, peer pressure etc.

The Government of India's National Tobacco Control Program (NTCP) supports advancing the provision laid down in India's tobacco control act (COTPA, 2003) through the State Tobacco Control Cell (STCC) and District Tobacco Control Cells (DTCCs). GATS-2 results shows that efforts made earlier have shown minor decline in (5.3% points) in tobacco consumption in the state which needs further push and support by different stakeholders.

MPVHA is implementing the project "Advancing Sustainable Tobacco Control through technical support, capacity building, multi-stakeholders engagement and effective implementation in Madhya Pradesh, India" with the support of Vital Strategies in collaboration with Department of Health, State Tobacco Control Cell, Administration, Police and other various departments. The following activities were organized during the reporting period.

Government of India has implemented various nutrition programs, such as the Poshan Abhiyaan, Mid-Day Meal Scheme, and Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS). Fortification of staple foods—like rice, wheat, salt, and edible oils—with essential vitamins and minerals (e.g., iron, folic acid, vitamin A, and vitamin D). Despite progress, sustained awareness, monitoring, and community participation remain critical to ensuring the long-term success of fortification strategies in improving public health outcomes across India.

Vulnerable population in India is severely affected by Iron deficiency. As per NFHS – 5 the Anaemia is a severe public health problem in India. In Madhya Pradesh the prevalence of anaemia is particularly high among women of reproductive age (15 to 49 years) i.e. 54.7% and 72.7 % in children as per the National Family Health Survey-5 (2019 - 21). To address the issue of Anaemia Government of Madhya Pradesh has taken several initiatives including large scale food fortification programs. The Government of Madhya Pradesh (GoMP) introduced Double Fortified Salt (DFS) in 89 tribal blocks of 20 tribal districts of Madhya Pradesh at INR 1 per kg through the Public Distribution System with the technical support of Nutrition International (NI) and its implementing partner Madhya Pradesh Voluntary Health Association (MPVHA) and subsequently program scaled up in across 52 districts of Madhya Pradesh in Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), District Hospitals (DH), and Nutrition Rehabilitation Centres (NRCs) from September 2021.

1 : Double Fortified Salt and Fortified Rice Program in Madhya Pradesh

From April 2022 onward MPVHA extending close technical support to roll out the Double Fortified Salt Program across the state in 180 blocks spread across 34 districts and Fortified Rice Program in across the 52 districts through PDS and all 52 districts for Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), Mid-day Meal (MDM), Tribal Welfare Department (TWD), District Hospitals (DH) and Nutrition Rehabilitation Centres. Fortified Rice is being in supply through the PDS to the NFSA beneficiaries and SSNPs in all 52 districts of Madhya Pradesh.

M. P. Voluntary Health Association is extending hands to the government in the execution of all the feasible activities to strengthen the program by engaging the key stakeholders in a strategic partnership to establish the processes, integrate the monitoring and reporting mechanism, improve supply chain management, capacity building and behaviour Change communications. Overall objective of the project is to support the Government of Madhya Pradesh in further improving the quality and sustaining the coverage of double fortified salt and rice fortification through SSNPs across the state.

Event & Campaign

Events and Campaign are one of the masses gathering activity where population comes in a mass. Government platforms were helpful to convey their message and increase awareness on fortification and bursting the myth regarding fortification. MPVHA team participated and supported in the following important events of the government:

The Universal Immunization Program (UIP) of India, is one of the largest public health programmes in the world. It targets around 30.4 million pregnant women and 26.7 million new born annually. Under UIP, the Government of India is providing vaccination free of cost against twelve vaccine preventable diseases. India has significantly improved immunization services and health outcomes over the past two decades. Between 2000 and 2017, under-five mortality from vaccine-preventable diseases (VPDs) decreased by 73 percent, against 61 percent for all causes. The number of under-immunized and zero-dose children plummeted by 80 percent between 2000 and 2019. As of 2019-20, 92.8 percent of Indian children received Full Immunization Coverage (FIC), a key success metric for UIP which stood at just 42 percent at the turn of the century. Progress on both FIC and zero-dose children has also accelerated since 2015. For improved FIC and introduction of new vaccine, there is need to have a tailored and strategic social and behaviour change communication for improving awareness, generating demand and ensuring public confidence in the vaccine.

As per GAVI 'Zero-dose' children are those who have not received even a single vaccine shot. For operational purposes, GAVI defines zero-dose children as infants who have not received the first dose of diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis-containing vaccine (DTP1) by the end of their first year of life. Under-immunised children are defined as infants who have not received the third dose of DTP-containing vaccine (DTP3) by the end of their first year of life. Missed communities are home to clusters of zero-dose and under-immunised children. These communities often face multiple deprivations and vulnerabilities, including lack of services, socio-economic inequities and often gender-related barriers. Nearly 50% of zero-dose children live in three key geographic contexts: urban areas, remote communities and populations in conflict settings.

MPVHA is implementing the project "Improving vaccine confidence and demand for routine immunization to reduce Zero Dose children in most marginalised and vulnerable population of Madhya Pradesh" with the support of UNICEF with a clear mandate to support the existing government system in identification of zero dose children and referring them for immunization services. The vaccination will be done by the government. This involves working closely with local influencers, CBOs, PRI members etc. to create social accountability for immunization, within the larger ambit of RMNCH+A.

The project is being implemented across 30 blocks in 10 priority districts of Madhya Pradesh—Balaghat, Barwani, Bhind, Morena, Rajgarh, Sehore, Shivpuri, Vidisha, Gwalior, and Mandsaur—which have been identified based on key public health indicators and immunization-related challenges. The implementation period spans 16 months, from November 11, 2024, to March 10, 2026. The project focuses on strengthening routine immunization and enhancing community engagement in alignment with government priorities.

Key Activities done during the period November 11, 2024 to 31 March 2025

1 : Establishment and Team Deployment

A Project Coordinator (PC), 10 District Coordinators (DCs) and 30 Block Coordinators have been placed across 30 blocks of 10 intervened districts to support field-level execution, community engagement, and regular monitoring.

2. Induction and Training of project team

Two induction programs were conducted to familiarize the project team with objectives, roles, and implementation strategies. The first internal induction was held in December 2024, followed by a second induction in January 2025. Technical experts were from UNICEF and Health department GoMP. In addition a three-day orientation program on "Social Behaviour Change (SBC)" was organized in February 2025, focusing on community engagement approaches and effective communication strategies to support project goals.

3. Social Mapping & PRA

Entry-level activities were conducted in 549 ASHA areas, and social mapping was completed in 222 villages across 10 districts. A total of 1,020 influencers were identified, with 510 actively engaged, including faith leaders, SHG members, PRI representatives, and teachers. Additionally, one missed community was identified in Bakheariya (Barwani) and another in March in Bhitwar block, Gwalior district.

4. Routine Immunization Activities

- A:** In February 2025, 83 zero-dose children (14 weeks–1 year) without Penta-1 were identified, of which 39 were linked to routine immunization. Additionally, 34 children above 1 year were found without Penta-1, and 1 child above 1 year was unvaccinated for MR-1. A total of 624 hesitant or resistant children were reported (72 urban, 552 rural), with 327 successfully converted (292 rural, 35 urban).
- B:** Missed Communities: 2 Missed community (Bakheariya, Sendhwa Block, Barwani and in Village Kaithi, SHC Bhegna, Bhitwar, Gwalior) were identified and has been successfully linked with RI services.
- C:** A head count survey was supported in 494 ASHA areas, with validation of repeat surveys conducted in 25 villages across all districts. In February, 3,507 house-to-house visits were carried out (224 urban and 2,383 rural), along with monitoring of 368 VHSND sessions to assess service delivery and community participation.

5: Identification of Ambassadors: 77 RI Ambassadors have been Identified and engaged.

6: District Task Force (DTF) meetings in Vidisha on 08.02.2025 and in Bhind on 01.03.2025 were attended by District Team, the meetings chaired by the District Collector and attended by officials from CMHO, DIO, PRI, WCD, Health, and Education departments. These meetings focused on RI micro planning, inter-departmental coordination, and addressing vaccine hesitancy.

7: Block Task Force (BTF) meetings were attended by team in Block Ghatigaon (Gwalior), Block Kirnapur (Balaghat), Block Lahar (Bhind), Blocks Kolaras and Pohari (Shivpuri), where discussions highlighted gaps in the headcount survey, the need for improved UWIN data entry.

Within a span of 5 months the project has been established, build the rapport with government functionaries, communities and influencers.

MPVHA efforts are widespread and at deeper levels always meant to purify the vibration of all those, who believe in community health promotion. The organization always stood with poor, marginalized and vulnerable population at the time of emergency or even during the epidemics and disasters. MPVHA is grateful to WEND Collective for their support during and post phase of COVID 19. Large number of most vulnerable and marginalized persons were benefited and protected with the WEND Collective support in the first phase. In second phase of the project 40 mentally ill, destitute and highly vulnerable women staying together at one center were supported. In the third phase i.e. in 2024-25 our focus was on prevention and control of Non Communicable Disease through Early Detection, Referrals & Linkages. A series of camps organized for early detection of Non-Communicable Diseases like Cancer, Cardiovascular, Chronic Respiratory and Diabetes, etc. Reason NCDs causes considerable loss in potentially productive years of life. According to Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), it is estimated that the proportion of deaths due to Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) in India have increased from 37.9% in 1990 to 61.8% in 2016.

The lack of awareness, limited access to quality healthcare services, inadequate infrastructure, and socio-economic disparities further exacerbate the burden of NCD in India. Treatment of NCD diseases is very costly and beyond the reach of common man especially poor and marginalized. Although government and many charitable institutions are extending support for these problems but unable to even subsidize 50 percent of the treatment cost. What is required that a network and referral services to be developed to supplement each other for the benefit of the poor people.

Prevention and Control of Non Communicable Disease through Early Detection, Referrals & Linkages for the Treatment of the needy sections of the Society.

MPVHA with the support of Wend Collective initiated the project on prevention and control of NCDs, especially early detection of cancer. The Purpose of this initiative was:

- Protect the people from NCDs with special attention to have early detection and treatment at an economical and affordable service centers through referrals.
- Sensitize the employers (industrialists) to create an atmosphere for better health of their employees to prevent such disease and extend some financial support.

Our strategy was to generate awareness on ill effects of lifestyle habits, tobacco use etc. which are partly responsible for NCD Epidemic, Generate awareness on early sign, symptoms and promote habits of regular Check ups. Promote early detection through screening at primary and secondary level with the help of various basic test at low cost (BP, Diabetes, Cytology, x-ray, Sonography, FNAC, PSA, etc.) for 30 years and above in Institutional settings.

The intervention area was Indore & near by Industrial Area (Dewas, Sanwer, Pithampur).

A total of 4 health checkup camps were organized. Early detection was done through the camp with referrals and linkages and continuous follow-up of patients was done from time to time.

The preference for male child remains one of the most glaring manifestations of gender discrimination in the society. With advancements in medical technology, the practice of gender bias has shifted from female infanticide to sex-selective abortions or female foeticide. Despite improvements in education, income, and life expectancy among certain groups of women, a significant portion of society continues to view daughters as burden.

Positive indicator: Awareness campaigns, legal enforcement, and education initiatives are gradually yielding positive results in several districts, the challenge persists. The empowerment of women through education and employment has certainly contributed to improving the status of the girl child. However, emerging gender-related issues continue to surface, emphasizing the need to strengthen the implementation of the **Pre-Conception and Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques (PCPNDT) Act, 1994** in the broader context of gender justice and violence prevention.

The PCPNDT Act mandates the establishment of regulatory authorities at both the central and state levels to ensure its effective implementation. Over the years, the Act has undergone amendments aimed at strengthening its provisions. Nevertheless, sex-selective abortions remain a pressing issue, highlighting ongoing gaps in enforcement.

Role of MPVHA in Supporting the PCPNDT Act Implementation

The **Madhya Pradesh Voluntary Health Association (MPVHA)**, in collaboration with the State and District Administration and the Department of Health (PCPNDT Cell), has consistently contributed towards the implementation and enforcement of the Act. Despite limited funding, the organization's efforts have been recognized by State and District Authorities as well as the media, encouraging continued dedication to the cause.

Key Activities Undertaken by MPVHA

1. Capacity Building and Awareness Campaigns

MPVHA, in partnership with District Administration and the Department of Health & Family Welfare (Government of Madhya Pradesh), has systematically addressed gender issues and the PCPNDT Act. This includes conducting orientation sessions, community meetings, distribution of IEC materials, strengthening the advisory committee, training of monitoring teams, and coordinated liaison with appropriate authorities.

2. Focused Initiatives in Indore District

As an active member of the PC&PNDT Advisory Committee, MPVHA has significantly supported the District Collector-cum-Appropriate Authority. Later CMHO as Appropriate Authority. Key contributions include training law enforcement personnel, community mobilization, and regular monitoring of a large number of ultrasound centers etc.

3. Statewide Support as a Resource Organization

MPVHA has served as a resource organization by providing IEC materials and expert personnel to State Authorities, District Collectors, and Regional Joint Directors (Health), thereby extending its impact beyond the local level.

4. Diagnostic Centers Monitoring

As a government-appointed member of the monitoring team, MPVHA assists in the appraisal of new applicants and conducts routine inspections of ultrasound, MRI, and CT scan centers within the city to ensure compliance with the Act.

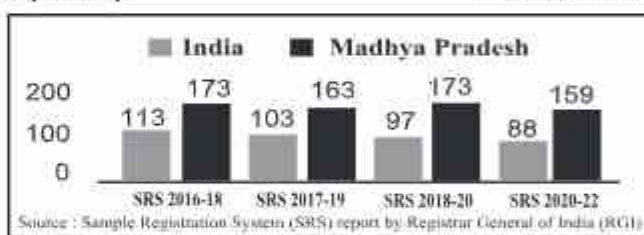

NOTES:

1. **Basic Information**
MPVHA is a charitable society registered under the Madhya Pradesh Societies Registration Act, 1973 having registered number 3922 dated: 05-09-1974
2. **Significant accounting policies:**
 1. **Basis of accounting and preparation of financial statements**
The financial statements of the society have been prepared in accordance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India (Indian GAAP) to comply with the Accounting Standards notified by the Government as applicable to charitable societies. The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis under the historical cost convention. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those followed in the previous year.
 2. **Use of estimates**
The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Indian GAAP requires the Management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the reported income and expenses during the year. The Management believes that the estimates used in preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Future results could differ due to these estimates and the differences between the actual results and the estimates are recognised in the periods in which the results are known / materialise.
 3. **Cash flow statement**
Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit / (loss) before extraordinary items and tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the society are segregated based on the available information.
 4. **Fixed Assets**
Fixed assets are recorded at the historical cost at which it is incurred. Addition to the fixed assets are totally written off in the income and expenditure account as Non-Recurring Expenses in the year in which it is incurred.
 5. **Fixed Assets - contd.**
To show the fixed assets in Balance Sheet, a contra entry is passed in the books Debiting respective fixed asset on the assets side and crediting a memorandum account Fixed Assets Fund (Contra) on the liability side of the Balance Sheet. Any sale / transfer / alienation of property shall be done by reducing the amount from both fixed assets and Fixed Asset Fund account in both the sides of the Balance Sheet.
 6. **Depreciation and amortisation**
The society is not charging Depreciation on fixed assets and whenever an asset is sold or transferred it is reduced at its original cost
 7. **Revenue recognition - Grants**
Income of the society is by way of grants and interest. Grants are recognised as income based on the agreement with the donor agencies. Grant which is not received during the year but is receivable is shown as Grant receivable in current assets.
 8. **Other income**
Interest income is accounted on accrual basis.
 10. **Intangible assets**
There is no intangible asset during the reporting period.
 11. **Taxes on income**
The society is registered under Section 12Aa of the Income Tax Act and has tax exemption subject to the conditions stipulated therein. Hence no provision has been made for income tax in the books of account.
 12. **Books of Account**
The society maintains different books for account for each project (both FC and local contributions. At the end of the financial year, separate Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt and Payment Account are prepared for each project. All FC projects are consolidated into one consolidated FC Financial Statement and all local projects are consolidated into one consolidated Local Financial statements. Finally a consolidated FC+LC Balance Sheet is prepared.
